Shabbat Services at Alyth

Throughout Jewish history, Shabbat has been at the heart of Jewish life, a distinctive and special time, different from the working week. At Alyth, we strive to uphold this holiness of Shabbat, with learning and multiple services to meet the needs of the community. Please help us to ensure that everyone can pray and participate by thinking about the needs of those around you. If you need to leave the service to avoid disturbing others, please note that the service can be watched on livestream, this week in the kindergarten.

To help us to separate Shabbat from the rest of the week, please switch off your mobile phone, and do not take photographs or video, or smoke/vape on the premises on Shabbat. When we want to show appreciation during a service, it is traditional not to applaud but to shout 'yasher koach' or 'sh'koach', which means 'strength to you.' Please refrain from applauding but join in this greeting.

In case of an emergency, evacuation of the building is either through the main entrance doors, congregating on Temple Grove, or via the kindergarten into the cemetery. Please do not gather on Alyth Gardens as this may block emergency services access.

We will make Kiddush together over wine and challah on Friday nights & Shabbat mornings to end our services. We ask that you please not drink or eat until we have said the blessings. On Shabbat, as through the week, we rely on the contribution of many of our members. Thank you to everyone who has helped to make this Shabbat special. *Shabbat Shalom.*

Isaiah 61:1-11

¹The spirit of my Sovereign God is upon me, because God has anointed me. I have been sent as a herald of joy to the humble, to bind up the wounded of heart, to proclaim release to the captives, liberation to the imprisoned; ² to proclaim a year of God's favour and a day of vindication by our God; to comfort all who mourn—³ To provide for the mourners in Zion to give them a turban instead of ashes, the festive ointment instead of mourning, a garment of splendour instead of a drooping spirit. They shall be called terebinths of victory, planted by God for glory's sake. ⁴ And they shall build the ancient ruins, raise up the desolations of old, and renew the ruined cities, the desolations of many ages.

⁵ Strangers shall stand and pasture your flocks, aliens shall be your plowers and vinetrimmers; ⁶ while you shall be called "Priests of God," and termed "Servants of our God." You shall enjoy the wealth of nations and revel in their riches. ⁷ Because your shame was double—men cried, "Disgrace is their portion"— assuredly, they shall have a double share in their land; joy shall be theirs for all time.
